Course description

In this class we will focus on textual learning directly from the Talmud. We will do this through class learning and chevruta learning. Through this process we will develop the vocabulary and skills to understand the intricacies of talmud and begin to develop the ability to learn independently. We will also explore the Shulchan Aruch as we learn to understand halacha and the implementation of current Jewish practices. We will also apply our learning to modern day issues and understand how to approach current hot topics through talmudic reasoning and in class debates.

Units of Study

- Review of Jewish texts including timelines of texts from Tanach to Shulchan Aruch
- Review of notable personalities from Rav Yehuda HaNasi to Rav Yosef Karo
- Studying the Shulchan Aruch and it's four components: Orach Chayim, Yoreh De'ah, Even HaEzer, Choshen Mishpat
- Examining differences between Ashkenazic and Sephardic traditions and focus on Rav Moshe Isserles' "Ha'Mapah".
- Text study: Masechet Brachot
